Zero Carbon Caravan



The zero carbon caravan is the idea of Chris Keene. The idea is to travel using zero carbon transport through the towns and cities of England, Wales and onto the continent to arrive at the International Climate Conference at Copenhagen on 5th December. On the way the caravan is going to hold a series of rallies, conferences and concerts which will all be zero carbon and raise awareness of the need to tackle climate change by creating a zero carbon economy. They will also visit projects aimed at meeting the challenge of climate change such as our local initiatives at Garden Organic at Ryton and Practical Action at Rugby.

Transition Town Leamington is a group which has formed to deal with the coming challenges of climate change and peak oil by encouraging a zero carbon local economy in areas such as food growing, transport and energy use by industry. They are looking for members to join in this exciting project. The Centre for Alternative Technology has already demonstrated in its Zero Carbon Britain report in 2007 www.zerocarbonbritain.com how Britain could completely decarbonise in twenty years.

A benefit concert is being organised by members of Transition Town Leamington to raise funds for the zero carbon caravan and at the same time increase awareness of the need to tackle climate change locally and internationally. It is hoped that the zero carbon caravan will take the views of the people of Leamington to Copenhagen. Chris Philpott is going to give mini talks on climate change to the audience throughout the concert. Gitta Ashworth has written songs about climate change and will lead a sing along session at the concert. The occasion will see the performance of 4 climate change songs by the Eco Worriers. It is hoped that young people will attend as two young vibrant and original local bands will be performing, Knoxville Paranoia and No Face. All Sparks are going to play a set and provide a P.A. and do the sound mixing for free and Dan Briton is going to charge up batteries with his solar generator and provide zero carbon energy to drive the amps. Matt Bishop of the Leam Boat Centre has kindly made available the venue at no cost.

The concert starts at 7:30 through to 11pm at the Leam Boat Centre, Mill Road, near Jephson Gardens on Friday September 4th. The £2.00 entrance fee is designed to make it affordable and enjoyable to all.

Britain's Green Communities

British Gas has opened up a new community energy fund of up to £2million, as part of a nationwide Green Streets campaign to search for Britain's innovative green communities.

The fund is in response to a growing grassroots movement of community groups across the country wanting to start their own energy project but needing help to get their own energy project plans off the ground.

Any community group can apply for part of the money with projects which can range from solar, wind or hydro power to bio-mass, ground source and air source heat pumps. Projects must involve local residents and businesses and include a site of importance to the community such as a sports club, pub, scout hut, church or mosque.

The short listed groups will be invited to present their project in an area near them. The presentations will be to an expert panel consisting of a mix of press, industry experts and British Gas representatives who will tour Great Britain to hear the presentations and to make a decision on which short listed projects will be allocated a share of the funding and provided with assistance to realise their project.

Interested community groups with energy projects should apply by the 31st August. Around fourteen community groups will be selected from across the country to share in the money. British gas will provide the funding, support and technical expertise to develop and implement the successful groups ideas. Next year all the projects will go head to head in a number of challenges to reduce energy use, generate local energy and increase support amongst members of their own community. Their progress will be monitored for a year by the Independent Institute of Public Policy Research think-tank.

The winning community project will receive a further £100,000 prize in funding from British Gas.
